The Cooperative Ministry hopes to see 25 additional used car donations through June 30 - the sale of which can generate funds to serve as many as 125 families with Financial Assistance and Empowerment services.

The Cooperative Ministry's Car Program accepts cars in any condition, and towing is free within 50 miles of Columbia.

Who donates cars to the Car Program?

"I hear from those who have inherited a car after the passing of a loved one, and they just don't want the extra expense of insurance and tag renewals," said Scott Vaughan, Director of Community Awareness, who manages the Car Program.

"Empty-nesters also donate the car used by their college students, or sometimes we get calls about old cars that need to be moved off the owner's property. It's not unusual to receive donations from company fleets and company and church vans. We've also been blessed with donations from used car dealers."

Because The Cooperative Ministry's Car Program is managed locally, the maximum funds possible are generated by local auction sales.

"Every car blesses families," Scott said. "We are debt-free, so the auction proceeds find their way to supporting services." All services are aimed toward helping people become self-sufficient, fulfilling The Cooperative Ministry's 40-year mission.

The City of Columbia applauds The Cooperative Ministry's debt-free status and that 90 percent of expenses support program services." The proclamation was signed by Mayor Rickenmann and council members Howard E. Duvall Jr., William Brennan, Tina N. Herbert, Edward H. McDowell Jr., Aditi Bussells, and the late Joe E. Taylor Jr.

From Beth H. Irick, CEO Understanding our 2022 impact numbers

In 2022, The Cooperative Ministry served 12,843 people. Those who are heads of household are the people you and I might see on any given day in Columbia. They are housekeepers, retail cashiers and assistant managers, laborers and



warehouse workers, nursing and medical assistants, food service employees, state government employees, and customer service representatives. Most of our client households are headed by a woman caring for two others in the household.

In 2022, The Cooperative Ministry provided 15,780 services to our clients. Why is the number of services greater than the 12,843 people we served? Because some clients qualify for multiple services. It's not unusual for someone seeking Financial Assistance also to need the clothing that so many of you donate for us to distribute freely to those in need. Someone coming for clothing might also engage our Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program or VITA, as we call it. (Our volunteers prepared 8,256 free tax returns in 2022).

Our clothing bank distributed 17,640 free clothing items for clients to use at work and school. We see 8 to 10 people daily who need clothing, and they love our new store setting in the clothing bank warehouse. This service number does not include clothing we distributed to other non-profits and government agencies like Richland 1 and 2 school districts.

COVID-19 closed some of our reliable food bank partners, which led us to provide emergency food boxes for hungry clients. We distributed 468 food boxes in 2022, and many of you, especially through your churches, made those boxes possible.

This short piece gives you a snapshot of our impact within the community. Every day, our staff joins volunteers (almost 500 in 2022) to serve our community as beneficiaries of your kindness and generosity. Your monetary donations, volunteer hours, clothing and food donations, and prayers all bless others. For that, I am so very thankful for you.

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
